

Introduction to Galatians (Part 1)

Galatians 1:1-5
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May 19, 2019

The Book of Galatians is a rescue mission that is based on a rescue mission. In Paul's introduction to the book, he reminds believers what we have been rescued from, through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Background (Acts 13:13 - 14:28)

Central to Paul's preaching in the province of Galatia is the message of Acts 13:38-39. God's law won't set you free; freedom is only found through Jesus Christ.

1. The Apostle (1:1) – "a sent one"

Apostles in the New Testament were a select group of men who were eyewitnesses to the life of ministry of Jesus Christ before AND after His resurrection. They were appointed by Jesus Christ with unique authority to speak the Word of God (cf. Ephesians 2:20; Matthew 10:2; Luke 6:13; Acts 1:2, 26; 1 Corinthians 15:7-9).

2. The gospel

- It was planned by God (v. 4).
- It is proven by the resurrection of Jesus from the dead (v. 1).
- It is all of grace (v. 3)

• It required that Jesus Christ give Himself in sacrifice to rescue sinners (v. 4). Jesus Christ gave Himself to rescue us not just from eternal suffering, but from bondage to sin in this present evil age. **Questions to Consider** 1. If you haven't already, read through Galatians in one sitting, as if you were reading a letter. What do you see as major themes? Are there key words or phrases that are repeated?
