## Remember This Promise | John 15:18-16:4

As a follower of Jesus Christ, you are commanded to remember His promise that you will face hatred and persecution, SO THAT you will not lose heart when it happens.

**Two critical commands in this passage relate to our thinking: "Know" (5:18) and "Remember" (5:21)**

**It is tempting for us to not want to think about the promise of hatred and persecution, but Jesus commands us to know it and remember it.**

**The suffering and hatred that Jesus Christ experienced is the pattern into which we walk.**

**Jesus Christ, and our union with Him, is the reason we will face hatred and persecution.**

**Why?**

**Because of the convicting work of Jesus Christ in us through His Spirit, illuminating people's unbelief and their lack of righteousness before God.**

**What Jesus did in person, and then does in an ongoing way through His Spirit in us, is to reveal man's sin.**

**Jesus commands us to know and remember His promise of persecution and hatred in order to keep us from falling away (16:1-4)**

### **Questions to Consider**

- 1.** Have you experienced persecution or suffering because of your faith in Jesus Christ?
- 2.** What's your initial, honest gut reaction to Jesus' promise that you will face hatred and persecution for resting your faith in Him?
- 3.** What might be modern-day equivalents of being "put out of the synagogue" on behalf of Jesus Christ?
- 4.** In what ways have you, or might you, have encounters with unbelievers that allow for the loving and convicting work of the Holy Spirit to flow through you?
- 5.** What are some ways in which a sense of self-protection for your life, or your family, or your possessions, keep you from declaring the gospel of Jesus Christ?
- 6.** Why is so important that we know and remember this promise?
